



- Generally, a fiscal note is a quantitative 1-4 page document attached to a piece of legislation that may change the spending or receipt of revenues to a government
- Depending on the criteria developed by the government, fiscal notes can be incredibly comprehensive or only focus on direct expenditures/revenues

Pros/Cons

- Fiscal notes help policymakers determine the return on the investment, or the potential impact a policy may have with respect to the goals of government
- However, a fiscal note can also have unintended consequences when not all information for consideration is presented

passed a two-and-a-half percent pay cut for state employees Tuesday

Under the plan, state workers will be able to take five extra days off this fiscal year.

State officials said state departments and unions will have to submit plans to the budget office on how to handle the extra days off.

Earlier this year, Gov. Jack Markell had proposed cutting state workers pay by eight percent in an effort to trim an \$800 million deficit.


However after months of protests from state employees, lawmakers agreed on a plan to make the pay cuts less severe.

State workers are also now paying more for health benefits. Many state workers are unhappy.

It's going to affect me. I've got a house full of people and I'm the only income," said DelDOT employee William Gallant.

The pay cuts went into effect July 1.

- Communicating the results








THE DIRECT

- These are often the easiest to calculate
- Most often are borne by government, in either increase or decrease in revenues/expenditures
- Understand the data gatekeepers




THE INDIRECT

- Most overlooked
- May have additional impacts that amplify initial plan
- Often require more assumptions




THE RESPONSE

- Well documented assumptions should turn to economic basis
- Explain, demonstrate, repeat
- Communicating the results is key
- Often the policy good is lost in part due to bad communication







THE START

Not all policies on their first design are the best

Fiscal Note: Direct Government Reduced Spending: \$560,900 annually

Not Included: Increased Household Income of \$560,900 across brackets

Question: Where does that extra money go?

THE PLAN

- Using a tool such as REMI, run those returns back into the economy along with reduced government spending
- Who has a higher impact? What are the unforeseen fiscal changes?



THE RESULTS
